 - Housing rehabilitation (no new construction)

- If applying for more than one program or project, complete a separate application for each.
- Read the specific program requirements in this NOFA before beginning an application.
- Save your work as you go; the program does not automatically save your work.
- Applicants may save their work and log out, and return later to complete their application(s).
- Applications are due by 5:00 p.m. on the deadline. Applicants may edit their applications up until 5:00 p.m. and then the applications will be closed and locked for editing. Applicants are **strongly encouraged to submit applications in advance of the deadline** to allow time to correct any errors before the deadline.

Introduction

The County Community Services Department’s Division of Housing and Community Development (HCD) is pleased to announce the availability of funding for several grants and loans to support CDBG facility and infrastructure improvements and public services for low-moderate income persons and special needs populations such as elderly, persons with disabilities, homeless and at-risk of homelessness, people with mental illness, people experiencing abuse, and person’s with HIV/AIDS. Funds support programs that will serve Santa Barbara County residents.

Please read this NOFA in its entirety before beginning an application. Direct questions to the County staff listed at the end of this document, or send questions to HCDNOFA@co.santa-barbara.ca.us.

County Consolidated Plan

The County develops a five-year Consolidated Plan as required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for all federal funds allocated to the County. Each year, the County prepares an Action Plan that carries out the Consolidated Plan priorities and goals. Approved projects utilizing federal funds will be included in the County’s 2021-22 annual Action Plan, which will be presented to the County Board of Supervisors for approval and submission to HUD. Applicants must tie their proposed programs and projects to the priorities listed in the Consolidated Plan. The priorities are derived from congressional goals, HUD priorities and local housing and community development needs. The priorities are provided in the application. Section I: CDBG Public Services

The Santa Barbara CDBG Urban County Partnership receives an annual allocation of federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Up to fifteen percent (15%) of the allocation may be used to support public services programs. The County’s Division of Housing and Community Development (HCD) is the lead entity of the CDBG Urban County Partnership, which includes the County and the cities of Carpinteria, Buellton and Solvang. Each jurisdiction receives a distribution of CDBG to either award in their respective communities, or pool with the County’s distribution to be awarded by the County. Unless otherwise noted in the application, the County administers the CDBG program on behalf of the Urban County partners.

CDBG grants will be awarded for County FY 2021 – 2022 (July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022). The chart below shows the *estimated* CDBG Public Services distributions to the County and partner cities:

Eligible Programs

CDBG may be used to fund a variety of programs, which are described at 24 CFR 570.201 Basic Eligible Activities. Funds are used to support programs that assist low- and moderate-income individuals and families.

Eligible activities include, but are not limited to:

- Employment services (e.g. job training)
- Crime prevention and public safety
- Childcare
- Health services
- Substance abuse services (e.g. counseling and treatment)
- Fair housing counseling
- Education program
- Energy conservation
- Services for senior citizens
- Services for homeless persons
- Welfare services (excluding income payments)
- Down payment assistance
- Recreation services

CDBG funds may be used to pay the operating costs of eligible nonprofit organizations, including staff salaries, supplies, rent, utilities, etc. that are necessary to administer services or to operate a facility in which services will be provided. Note that a cost allocation plan will be required for organizational costs that are allocated to several programs and/or funding sources, such as rent, utilities, and certain staff positions.

The County has set a **minimum** CDBG Public Services grant amount of \$15,000. An exception applies to applicants who apply solely for partner jurisdictions' CDBG distributions which are less than \$15,000.

HCD staff will conduct a preliminary review of applications for CDBG eligibility. Eligible applicants then will be scheduled for presentations before the County's Human Services Commission Allocation committee. A schedule of presentations will be posted to the HCD website at <http://cosb.countyofsb.org/housing/> and sent to applicants via the email addresses included in their applications in advance of the meeting.

Eligible Public Services Organizations:

- Must be a 501(c)(3) charitable organization under IRS rules;
- Must qualify program beneficiaries using one of the following three methods:
 1. **Limited Clientele.** Collect income information on all of its clientele (low-income and non-low income) and demonstrate that at least 51% of the persons served have household incomes at or below 80% of the area median income (AMI);

HUD will publish FY 2021 income limits about spring of 2021. Income eligibility is determined per 24 CFR 5.609 – 617 (same as for the Housing Choice Voucher/Section 8 program, administered by Public Housing Authorities)

2. **Presumed Benefit.** The proposed program *exclusively* serves persons who are presumed to be low-income, which include, abused children, battered spouses, elderly persons, adults meeting the Bureau of the Census' Current Population Reports definition of “severely disabled,” homeless persons, as defined by HUD, illiterate adults, persons living with AIDS, and migrant farm workers; or
3. **Area Benefit.** The proposed program’s service area is primarily residential and at least 51% of the residents in the service area are low-income. The service area may be a neighborhood, a city, or a portion of the County identified by census tracts. Note that a service area that includes the entire County does not qualify. To find out if your service area is at least 51% LMI, click on the link to the low moderate-income map below. Once the map has loaded, zoom in on your service area and census tracts, and block groups will appear. By clicking on the block groups of your service area, you can determine the LMI %.

Review Process

County Public Services applications are first reviewed by HCD staff for basic CDBG eligibility and financial capacity. CDBG-eligible applications then are forwarded for review and scoring by the County’s Human Services Commission’s Allocation Committee. The Committee will hold a meeting to hear applicant presentations followed by deliberation to make funding recommendations. Funding recommendations are based on scores, HSC priorities, and geographic considerations to ensure cross-county coverage. County staff forwards the recommendations to the County Board of Supervisors. The Board will make final funding awards at a regularly scheduled public hearing. The approved programs are included in the County’s annual Action Plan for submission to HUD. See the NOFA schedule in this document for the dates of HSC meetings and Board hearing. All applicants are encouraged to attend the Committee meeting and Board of Supervisors public hearing. Applicants who wish to speak at the hearing must submit a request to speak. Factors considered include:

- Program meets a Consolidated Plan priority
- Applicant’s commitment to comply with federal regulations, including income-qualifying beneficiaries per 24 CFR Part 5 (Area Benefit and Presumed Benefit activities excluded)
- Population to be served
- Program meets a community need
- Organizational goals and objectives, performance targets and outcomes

- Collaboration with like organizations
- Administrative capacity
- Financial capacity

The Human Services Commission also has adopted priorities for funding consideration as follows:

- Sustain critical social service safety net programs countywide for children, families, seniors, homeless, persons with disabilities, victims of abuse and other vulnerable populations;
- Feed seniors, homebound persons, and low-income families;
- Shelter the homeless;
- Provide medical services including mental health counseling; and
- Help to ensure access to services for all vulnerable populations.

Section II: CDBG Assistance to Micro-Enterprise Businesses

A micro-enterprise business is defined by HUD as a commercial enterprise that has five or fewer employees, one or more of whom owns the enterprise. “Persons developing microenterprises” means such persons who have expressed interest and who are, or after an initial screening process are expected to be, actively working toward developing businesses, each of which is expected to be a microenterprise at the time it is formed.

Assistance to Micro-Enterprise Businesses helps to facilitate economic development by providing:

- Credit, including but not limited to grants, loans, loan guarantees, and other forms of financial support, for the establishment, stabilization, and expansion of microenterprises;
- Technical assistance, advice, and business support services to owners of microenterprises and persons developing microenterprises; and
- General support, including but not limited to peer support programs, counseling, childcare, transportation, and other similar services, to owners of microenterprises and persons developing microenterprises; and/or
- Training, technical assistance, or other support services to increase the capacity of the organization to carry out activities.

Applicants who wish to apply for these funds are to complete an application for public services programs.

The County’s Division of Housing and Community Development (HCD) is the lead entity of the CDBG Urban County Partnership, which includes the County and the cities of Carpinteria, Buellton, and Solvang. Each jurisdiction receives a distribution of CDBG to either award in their respective communities, or pool with the County’s

distribution to be awarded by the County. The County administers the CDBG program on behalf of the Urban County partners.

Notes:

2. Partner cities may use their funding distributions for programs and projects in their own communities or pool their funds with the County's for distribution via County NOFA and award process.
3. The estimated annual allocation does not include unused funds from prior years and program income (loan repayments). Program income may be listed separately.

Applications for projects located in a partner city must include a letter of support from the city demonstrating the City's support of the project, as well as the City's knowledge of the application being made to the County for the City's portion of CDBG funds. The County will notify the City in which a project is proposed.

CDBG regulations permit the use of funds for a wide range of activities, including, but not limited to:

- Housing Activities (no new construction)
- Real Property Improvements
- Public Facilities, Special Assessments, and Privately-owned Utilities
- Economic Development activities

CDBG funds may be used to pay for construction costs, project management, labor and materials, etc.

Eligible applicants include:

- Non-profit 501(c)(3) charitable organization under IRS rules;
- For-Profit organizations (certain economic development activities only); and
- Public Sector Jurisdictions. Note that buildings used for the general conduct of government business are limited to funding of ADA improvements only.

Projects must:

1. Serve a clientele where at least 51% of the persons served have household incomes at or below 80% of the area median income (AMI), as determined and published by HUD annually (Limited Clientele²); or
2. Exclusively serve persons who are presumed to be low-income, which include, abused children, battered spouses, elderly persons, adults meeting the Bureau of the Census' Current Population Reports definition of "severely disabled," homeless persons, illiterate adults, persons living with AIDS, and migrant farm workers (Presumed Benefit); or
3. Have as its service area an area that is primarily residential, and the service area census tracts are those where at least 51% of the residents are low-income (Area Benefit). The service area may be a neighborhood, a city, or a portion of the County identified by census tracts. Note that a service area that includes the entire County does not qualify. To find out if your project's service area is at least 51% LMI, click on the link to the low moderate-income map below. Once the map has loaded, zoom in on your service area and census tracts, and block groups will appear. By clicking on the block groups of your service area, you can determine the LMI %.

Application Review

County applications are reviewed by HCD staff for basic CDBG eligibility, applicant capacity, and other factors listed below. A staff report, with staff recommendations, is forwarded to the County's Capital Loan Committee for consideration of CLC funding recommendations. The Capital Loan Committee may concur with staff recommendations or make other recommendations. Recommendations then are presented to the County Board of Supervisors to make final funding awards.

Project considerations include:

- Amount of request and percent of CDBG funds to total project costs
- Project budget
- Project readiness³ and timeline*

² Organizations must collect income information on all of its clientele and demonstrate that at least 51% of the persons served are low-income. Income eligibility is determined per 24 CFR Part 5.609 – 617 (same as for the Public Housing Section 8 program.)

- Level of environmental review required
- Population to be served
- Program meets a community need
- Staff capacity and experience in managing federal capital development projects
- Financial capacity
- Commitment to comply with federal regulations, including income-qualifying beneficiaries per 24 CFR 5.609-617 (Area Benefit and Presumed Benefit activities excluded)

*HUD imposes strict expenditure deadlines of CDBG funds. CDBG funds will be available about October 2021 and projects must be completed before June 30, 2022, with at least 50% of the funds drawn by April 30, 2022.

Real estate improved with CDBG funds is subject to a five-year “use period,” meaning that the use of the facility must continue for the same purpose for five years following the close-out of the funding contract. Owners of projects that do not continue the approved use for 5 years will be subject to repayment of the CDBG funds plus a portion of the equity attributable to the improvements funded with CDBG. Housing projects may be subject to longer term restrictions on occupant income and monthly rent for rental housing, and home buyer income and sales price on homeowner housing.

Section IV: CDBG Homeowner Rehabilitation

Eligible Programs

Homeowner Rehabilitation under CDBG allows activities that help qualifying homeowners improve their homes. Eligible activities include, emergency repairs, handicapped accessibility, energy efficiency and weatherization, among others. Assistance may be provided in the form of grants, loans, loan guarantees and other forms of assistance. For a more detailed description of Homeowner Rehabilitation activities, requirements, and program guidelines please refer to the Homeowner Rehabilitation application and associated materials associated with this NOFA.

Agencies interested in undertaking a CDBG Homeowner Rehab Program must apply using the application for CDBG Capital Projects. Applications are reviewed in the same manner as described above under CDBG Capital Projects.

- Applicant’s commitment to comply with federal regulations, including income-qualifying beneficiaries per 24 CFR Part 5
- Target area and population to be served
- Program meeting and addressing a community need
- Organizational goals and objectives, performance targets and outcomes
- Applicant experience and administrative and financial capacity
